

On the newspaper, sketch out the shape of the moustache that you want. I'll give you the freedom to figure out the

shape and size. If you do one a fold in

try. Also give yourself a seam allowance, which is adding about a quarter inch to the outside of your pattern.

Place your fabric on a flat clean surface and fold in half, having the patterned side of the fabric facing inward.

Place your template on your fabric; if you have any pins use them to keep the paper in place. Otherwise, place some small knick-knacks on the paper – the weight will prevent the paper from shifting around.

With the patterned sides of the fabric facing each other, sew around the shape leaving a 2 inch gap. I would put the

gap in a part of the shape that relatively straight. It you're going with the

fabric glue route, be sure to keep the line of glue a consistence distance from the edge.

Put your hand in the hole you left open and bring the fabric through the hole to turn the shape inside out. Once it's flipped over I would use a pencil to push out any points that you placed in your template.

6) Fill it with stuffing!

Make a blind stitch to close up the hole (Google can describe it more efficiently than I can).

Give your pillow a big hug!



few things. First, how did they get into my apartment? Did I give you a key? If not, we have a problem. Second, are you going to





One step closer to romper mode!

MATERIALS:

Scissors
Steel Ruler
Zipper x 2
Sewing Machine
Seam Ripper
Cloth Tape
Measure

If you've worn your flightsuit, you'll know that it gets extremely warm despite the relatively thin material. One option is wearing it with the top folded down and the arms tied around your waist; the other way is to remove the arms.

This is a challenging mod that requires some basic knowledge of a sewing machine, and considerable patience. Begin by laying your flightsuit down flat and, following Fig. 1, use a cloth tape measure to measure along the seam of your sleeve (where the sleeve meets the body of the suit) then double that number. For me the result

was 24", which was the length of the zippers I purchased from Fabricland.

Next, begin by carefully ripping the stitches of the seam of the sleeve (Fig 1). Some people cut their sleeves with scissors; however, ripping the seam takes longer but pays off in the end with a far more professional appearance. Under the arm, the seam does a double fold and will take considerably longer to rip but again, it is worth the effort (Fig 3).

Next, you need to decide how to place your zippers. Personally I placed mine such that when the sleeves are removed the zipper pull-tab remains with the sleeve and not on the suit. This means reversing the direction of the zipper on one sleeve. The benefit is that you don't have a little zipper pull dangling free and poking you in the arm pit when the sleeves are off. The downside is that it is possible to put your left sleeve on the right side and vice-a-versa. The suit will still be wearable but just feel very




FIGURE 2: SEAM RIPPER

wrong (trust me).





FIGURE 4: ZIPPER PLACEMENT

I began on my suit by placing the female end of the zipper starting under the arm and aligned with the bottom center of the arm hole. This is where slowly removing the stitches pays off, as the fabric would have stayed nicely folded over, giving you something to align the zipper to. If you have a zipper foot for your sewing machine, use it, but this can also be done with a standard

foot. Place the zipper and suit under the needle of the machine and stitch forward 1 cm, then press the reverse button to stitch backward 1 cm (Fig 4). This backward stitching is important, as it locks the stitches. Carefully and slowly continue to stitch along the zipper, trying to keep the same distance between the edge of the suit and the stitching. When you get to the end of the zipper, once again reverse stitch 1 cm,

then forward again to lock the stitching. For a professional look, I did a second line of stitches parallel to the first but offset by 0.2-0.5 cm. The process is the same for the other side of your suit, but if you want to keep the zipper pulls on your sleeves, you will have to reverse the direction of the zipper (i.e. one will pull forward to open and the other will pull backwards to open).

Next, zip both halves of the zippers together and then place your sleeve over the zipper fabric and pin it into place using straight pins. Once you are happy with the placement of your sleeves, unzip the zipper and sew it in place using the machine and the same technique as for the main body. Don't forget to reverse stitch at the beginning and at the end to lock your stitches in place.




What had you even been doing instead of studying, again?



What if I told you that you could have it all: good grades, a social life, and even a good night's sleep? Okay, I might be exaggerating, we are in engineering after all! However, there is a way that you can have better grades, more free time, and more sleep! Engineering is a difficult program, and many streams have overloaded semesters. To be honest, I'm not sure how we are expected to learn everything we need to know in only 4 years without our brains exploding. This is where the 5 year plan comes in!

There are many benefits to doing a 5 (or 6 or 7) year

- Better schedules and days off
- Reduced stress levels
- Getting more out of the course material

All Hail the 5 (or 6...or 7) Year Plan

- Better grades
- More free time
- Ability to work part time
- Instead of "getting through" engineering, you can enjoy your education

The main cons to taking extra time to complete your degree are money and time. These are valid points, but I believe that the benefits of the 5 year plan often outweigh these cons. Having an extra year substantially increases the enjoyment of school, and allows for the university experience to be less of a means to get a piece of paper with your name on it and more of a positive life experience. As someone who is doing a 5 year plan (and paying for my own tuition), I believe that for me the extra year is well worth the extra time and money.

If you are worried about the cost involved in taking a 5th year, consider taking 3 courses per term for one (or a few) terms. In doing this you are considered a part time student, and so you only have to pay part time student fees (you save approximately \$2000 a

semester, and are still eligible for the Upass). This also gives you time to work part time, get involved, and have a social life. Co-op and/or summer internships can also help cover additional tuition costs.

Are you sold yet?

How to make a 5 year plan:

Step 1: Look up your programs prerequisite tree at Carleton.ca and save it to your computer. Use the latest version of the prerequisite tree when mapping out your courses.

Step 2: Figure out which courses have prerequisites. Do this by looking at your course tree: arrows connect courses to their prerequisites, you need to pass these courses to move on to the next level. Don't worry though, if you fail a prerequisite all is not lost. It is possible to request an exception so that you can take a course at the same time as the failed prerequisite; discuss this with your departmental advisor.

> Dashed arrows indicate concurrent prerequisites, which means that the concurrent prerequisite can be

taken prior to or at the same time the corresponding

course.

Take a look so see if any of the course have "2nd, "3rd", or "4th" above them in small letters. If they do that means that 2nd, 3rd, or 4th year status is required as a prerequisite to take the course.

2nd year status:

"Successful completion of all Engineering, Science and Mathematics course requirements in the first year of the program, all English as a Second Language Requirements, and any additional requirements as determined in the admissions process".

3rd year status: "Successful completion of 4.0 credits from the second year requirements of the program".

4th year status: "Successful completion of all second year requirements and 3.5 credits from the third year requirements of the program".

Step 3: Figure out if any of your courses are offered in the summer. Summer courses can give you extra flexibility. Check the public class schedule in Carleton Central, or use the "Build Your Timetable" tool o Carleton Central to find potential summer courses.

Step 4: Make a hypothetical schedule, moving around courses and considering any prerequisites until you find something that works well.

Step 5: Meet with your departmental administrator to discuss your plan. Come prepared with your prerequisite tree and your hypothetical schedule. The departmental administrator will help you tweak your plans and make adjusting your schedule a lot easier.


Step 6: Adjust your 5 year plan as needed, figure out what course load works best for you and enjoy your university experience.
